New Drive-Up Ballot Drop Boxes Now Available in Newport, Lincoln City and Waldport



New drive-up ballot drop boxes are now available at the Lincoln County Courthouse in Newport, the Lincoln City City Hall in Lincoln City, and the Waldport City Hall in Waldport.

These drive-up ballot drop boxes will be available 24 hours a day, 7 days a week from April 10 through 8:00pm on May 20.

Newport:

Lincoln County Courthouse – located in rear parking lot at the east end of the second row of parking.

Go west on West Olive Street to 4-way stop by the jail.

Turn left onto SW Nye Street.

Turn left into second entrance to courthouse rear parking lot.

Go all the way to the end of the row and you will see the ballot box on the left side. (It is marked “Official Ballot Drop Site.”)

Put your ballot in the box without having to get out of your car!

Lincoln City:

Lincoln City City Hall – located in the lower parking lot under the City Hall.

Turn west at the stop light by the City Hall. (across from Burger King).

Enter the one-way entrance to the parking lot under the building.

The ballot box is near the elevators next to the water payment box and the book and video drops.

(It is marked “Official Ballot Drop Site.”)

Put your ballot in the box without having to get out of your car!

Waldport:

Waldport City Hall – located in the City Hall parking lot at the east exit.

Go to City Hall on Highway 34.

Turn south between the City Hall and the school.

Take an immediate right into the City Hall parking lot.

Continue around the island and you will see the ballot box on the left by the exit. (It is marked “Official Ballot Drop Site.”)

Put your ballot in the box without having to get out of your car!

Measure 21-121 City of Lincoln City

Ballot Title

21-121

Amends Charter to increase lodging tax by 1.5 percent

Question: Should the City of Lincoln City transient room tax be increased from 8 percent to 9.5 percent?

Summary: This Charter amendment will not change how revenues from the existing 8 percent transient room tax are currently allocated. The amendment will increase the lodging tax paid by visitors to Lincoln City by 1.5 percent. The revenues from the 1.5 percent tax increase will be allocated at least 70 percent to tourism promotion or facilities including non-profit events and programs, and no more than 30 percent to public safety and general fund purposes.

Chapter 11 of the City Charter presently provides for a transient room tax in the amount of eight percent to be imposed on the occupant of overnight lodging in Lincoln City hotels and motels. The revenues of the 8 percent tax are directed as follows: one eighth to repayment of bonds for the Civic Center, two eighths to tourism marketing of Lincoln City through the Visitors and Convention Bureau, one eighth to public safety purposes, and four eighths to street maintenance and improvements, parks maintenance and improvements, visitor signs, and administrative costs of these tax-related expenditures.

Explanatory Statement

Chapter 11 of the Lincoln City Charter currently imposes a lodging tax of eight percent. The tax is imposed on the occupant of the lodging, not on the operator of the lodging.

This Charter amendment will increase the amount of lodging tax imposed, from eight (8) percent to nine and one-half (9.5) percent.

There are four main reasons for this Charter amendment:

1. The additional 1.5 percent lodging tax is estimated to provide additional revenues of \$670,000. The city anticipates beginning in 2008-2009 the City will not have sufficient funds in the general fund to provide all essential services. Additional revenues will be necessary to provide services.
2. The City is required to fund public safety and essential services for residents and visitors alike. In 2008-2009, the City anticipates the need for additional funds for adequate services that support the tourism industry including road maintenance and public safety. It is appropriate to require visitors, who place additional demand on these City services, to pay a share of the services. The City may not use more than 30 percent of the 1.5 percent increase in lodging tax on public safety and general fund purposes. Estimated revenues from the tax increase would be available in the amount of \$201,000 for City services including police and roads.
3. The City must allocate at least 70 percent of the estimated revenue or \$469,000 to tourism promotion and facilities including programs, festivals, and other events. There is opportunity to widen the tourism market during the shoulder and off-season, from September 16 to June 30, when additional economic development would be advantageous. Based on the historic record of visitation, the lodging industry would be among the principal beneficiaries of increased visitation by tourists during this time.
4. Additional revenues would allow the City to support local programs, festivals, and events that would help to develop the tourism industry during off-peak months. The City has many local organizations that would benefit from this support.

Measure 21-122 City of Yachats

Ballot Title

21-122

Purchase of Land for Water Reservoir South of the Bridge

Question: Should the City purchase land for a water reservoir south of the Yachats River Bridge, price not to exceed \$100,000.

Summary: Referred to the Voters by the City Council. All water customers south of the Yachats River are served by one main line crossing the river at the bridge. Constructing a .25 million gallon treated water reservoir at a location south of that bridge will increase the water reserves, provide more uniform flow and pressure distribution in the southern half of the water system and reduce interruptions in service if the transmission line crossing the river were damaged. Several potential sites have been identified. The Public Works Director and the City's engineers are performing a siting study to confirm the best location and elevation for the reservoir. This study will consider ease of access, design considerations and purchase price. The City Council shall, following a public hearing adopt formal "Findings of Fact" stating the selection rationale and identifying the proposed lot before purchasing any lot. Yachats City Charter requires authorization from voters for land purchase. Purchase price not to exceed \$100,000 and to be paid from existing reserves.

There were no arguments filed for or against this measure.

Explanatory Statement

At this time, the City has adequate treated water storage capacity for existing demand levels. However, additional treated water storage reserves will be required as the population grows. Currently all water customers south of the Yachats River are served by one main line that crosses the river at the bridge. The need to construct a .25 million gallon (MG) treated water reservoir at a location south of that bridge has been identified in both the Master Water Plan of 2001 and the Urban Renewal Plan of 2006. The reservoir will increase the City's treated water reserves, provide more uniform flow and pressure distribution in the southern half of the water system and reduce interruptions in service if the transmission line crossing the river were damaged. Several potential sites have been identified. The Public Works Director and the City's engineers are performing a siting study to confirm the best location and elevation for the reservoir. The siting study will also consider ease of access, cost to improve the access, design considerations and purchase price. The City Council shall, following a public hearing adopt formal "Findings of Fact" stating the selection rationale and identifying the proposed lot before purchasing any lot. Authorization from the voters is required by City Charter before any land for the project can be purchased. The purchase price for the land shall not exceed \$100,000 and will be paid from existing reserves.

To write-in a name — Fill in the oval (●) to the left of the dotted line and write-in the name on the dotted line.

If you vote for more candidates than allowed, or if you vote **both Yes and No** on a measure, it is called an overvote.

Your vote **will not count** for that candidate or measure.

You do not have to vote on all contests. Those you do vote on will still be counted.

Contact Lincoln County Elections office at 541-265-4131 to request a replacement ballot if:

- you make a mistake
 - your ballot is damaged or spoiled
 - your ballot is lost
- or for any other reason.

Remember, if stated on your ballot, vote both sides of your ballot.

After voting—SEAL the ballot in the ballot secrecy envelope.

SEAL your BALLOT (enclosed in the secrecy envelope), inside the return envelope, SIGN THE RETURN ENVELOPE in the space provided, and mail it in time to be received in the office of the County Clerk by May 20th, or drop it off at a designated drop site (see drop sites on page 21-2 of this county voters' pamphlet).

REMEMBER!

All ballots must be voted and received at a drop site or the Lincoln County Clerk's Office by no later than 8:00 p.m., May 20, 2008.
