THE OFFICE OF SHERIFF

Thomas Jefferson, in his work called "The Value of Constitutions", wrote "the office of Sheriff is the most important of all the executive offices in the country".

After two hundred years, experience has proven that the perspective of Jefferson and our founding fathers is just as valid today as it was when they first perceived of how a free society could be structured.

The office of Sheriff is certainly significant, and was in fact the first county office established in the United States. Some very outstanding Americans have held the office of County Sheriff, from the earliest days down to our present era. George Washington father was an early Sheriff in Colonia Virginia.

The first person to read the Declaration of Independence publicly was John Nixon, the Sheriff in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, in 1776.

According to tradition, the framers of the Declaration of Independence could not decide who should read the document publicly. After a lengthy discourse, it was decided that John Hancock should have the honor.

Hancock declined saying that he would already be number one on the blacklist of King George because of his emboldened signature.

After more discussion it was decided that the Sheriff of Philadelphia, John Nixon, would be the first man to read the Declaration of Independence publicly.

Nixon accepted the honor in somewhat the spirit the same spirit of Nathan Hale and is reported to have said that he would be happy to lose his life in order to have that distinction.

The Sheriffs of America have indeed played a significant role in the history of our Nation, and the Sheriffs of Oregon are certainly no exception to this




WHY YOUR SUPPORT MATTERS

MISSION

To promote, protect, preserve, enhance and support the Office of Sheriff as conservator of the peace in providing public safety services to the citizens of Oregon.

HISTORY

The Oregon State Sheriffs' Association was formed in 1916 to give Oregon sheriffs a single, effective voice – every sheriff working diligently with their fellow sheriffs through the Oregon State Sheriffs' Association to update and improve their profession and to elevate the entire law enforcement system through cooperation with all other law enforcement agencies, from the FBI to the one-man police departments.

MEMBERSHIP

THE DUTY OF THE SHERIFF

In each of the 36 counties in Oregon, the Sheriff is the chief law enforcement officer. His primary duty is to give full police protection to the unincorporated areas of the county. However, he maintains full police jurisdiction in all municipalities.

His responsibilities cover the entire spectrum of law enforcement – criminal investigation, search and rescue, service of legal process of the courts, operation of the county jail, and total police services on a 24-hour basis. The Sheriff's Office must provide court security, transport all criminals to and from penal institutions, and is also called upon to handle mental patients within their jurisdiction.

In many counties the Oregon Sheriff is directing large numbers of personnel, and managing budgets in excess of several million dollars. The efficient and effective management of the Sheriff's Office demands a highly trained and experienced Sheriff.

All Sheriffs have full police authority in any county in Oregon when requested by another Sheriff. In this respect, these men have established great working rapport. The communication between the respective Sheriffs is effective, efficient, and a true service to the people of Oregon.
