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STATE MEASURES

Measure 111– Amends Constitution: State must ensure affordable healthcare access, balanced against requirement to fund schools, other essential services

Result of “Yes” Vote: “Yes” vote requires state to ensure affordable healthcare access. State must balance healthcare funding against funding for schools, other essential services; courts must respect balance.

Result of “No” Vote: “No” vote retains current law. The constitution does not require the state to ensure access to affordable health care; state provides some healthcare access.

Summary: Amends Constitution. Current state law outlines the general requirements for health insurance policies and provides health care for low income and disabled residents who meet eligibility requirements. Amends the Oregon Constitution to establish health care as a fundamental right; obligates the state to provide Oregon residents “access to cost-effective, clinically appropriate and affordable health care.” Amendment requires the state to balance that obligation against the public interest in funding public schools and other essential public services. If the state is sued to enforce the amendment, the court may not order a remedy that interferes with the state’s requirement to balance healthcare funding against funding for public schools and other essential public services.

Measure 112– Amends Constitution: Removes language allowing slavery and involuntary servitude as punishment for crime

Result of “Yes” Vote: “Yes” vote amends constitution to remove language allowing slavery and involuntary servitude as punishment for crime; allows programs to be ordered as part of sentencing.

Result of “No” Vote: “No” vote retains current language that generally prohibits slavery and involuntary servitude but allows slavery and involuntary servitude as punishment for crime.

Summary: Amends Constitution. Article I, section 34 of the Oregon Constitution currently prohibits slavery and involuntary servitude but allows an exception to that prohibition as a punishment for crime. Measure removes language that allows slavery and involuntary servitude as a punishment for crime. Under measure, a court or probation or parole agency is allowed to order a person convicted of a crime to engage in education, counseling, treatment, community service, or other alternatives to incarceration, as part of sentencing for the crime. Ordered programs must be in line with programs that historically, or in the future, have been in place to provide for accountability, reformation, protection of society, or rehabilitation. Effect on current constitutional provisions requiring inmate work programs unclear.

Measure 113– Amends Constitution: Legislators with ten unexcused absences from floor sessions disqualified from holding next term of office

Result of “Yes” Vote: “Yes” vote disqualifies legislators with ten unexcused absences from legislative floor sessions from holding office as legislator for term following current term of office.

Result of “No” Vote: “No” vote retains existing law. Absent legislators may be punished by legislative chamber (potentially expelled by supermajority); present legislators have legal authority to compel attendance.

Summary: Amends Oregon Constitution to add language prescribing consequences for unexcused absences by legislators from floor sessions. Currently, Senators and Representatives may be “punished” or, by the concurrence of

two-thirds of the Senator's or Representative's chamber, "expelled" for "disorderly behavior," but law does not define "disorderly behavior." Additionally, absent legislators may be "compelled" to attend legislative floor sessions, but current law does not specify consequences for unexcused absences. Measure specifies that "disorderly behavior" includes legislator's failure to attend ten or more legislative floor sessions during a regular or special legislative session without permission or excuse. Under measure, legislator who engages in "disorderly behavior" through unexcused absences is disqualified from serving as a Senator or Representative for the term following the end of the legislator's current term.

Measure 114– Requires permit to acquire firearms; police maintain permit/firearm database; criminally prohibits certain ammunition magazines

Result of "Yes" Vote: "Yes" vote requires background check, safety training, fee for permit to acquire firearms; state police maintain new permit/ firearm database; criminally prohibits certain magazines; exceptions.

Result of "No" Vote: "No" vote retains current law: seller/ transferor must request criminal background check; permit, safety course not required; no magazine capacity restrictions.

Summary: Oregon law currently allows persons over age 18 to acquire firearms (federal law requires age 21 for some handgun purchases), seller/ transferor must request criminal background check. Measure requires permit from local law enforcement to acquire firearm; person must pay fee, submit photo ID, fingerprints, complete approved safety training, pass criminal background check, not be prohibited from possessing firearms; officer may deny permit to person believed danger to self or others. Permit issued within 30 days, valid 5 years. Permit denials appealable. Must present permit, pass background check to acquire firearm. State Police creates/ maintains permit/ firearm database. Magazines over 10 rounds, or readily modifiable to exceed 10 rounds, prohibited; exception for current owners /inheritors. Exceptions for law enforcement, armed forces. Criminal penalties. Other provisions.

LOCAL MEASURES

MEASURE 21-210 – CITY OF TOLEDO – Prohibits psilocybin-related businesses within Toledo for two years.

QUESTION

Shall Toledo prohibit psilocybin-related businesses for two years?

SUMMARY

State law allows for the manufacturing, transportation, delivery, sale and possession of psilocybin, the psychedelic drug found in certain mushrooms. State law provides that a local government may adopt an ordinance to be referred to the voters to prohibit the establishment of licensed psilocybin product manufacturers and/or psilocybin service centers. The Toledo City Council adopted an ordinance to refer to the voters that temporarily prohibits psilocybin-related businesses in Toledo to enable the city to consider local regulations once the state's psilocybin regulatory program is established.

Approval of the measure would prohibit the establishment of psilocybin product manufacturers and psilocybin service centers within the area subject to the jurisdiction of City of Toledo until December 31, 2024.

**MEASURE 21-211 – LAKE POINT SPECIAL ROAD DISTRICT–Lake Point Special Road District
Local Option Tax Measure**

QUESTION

Shall LPSRD establish an additional tax for operations of .7489 per \$1000 assessed value for five years beginning 2023-2024?

This measure may cause property taxes to increase more than three percent.

SUMMARY

If this local option tax is approved by voters, Lake Point Special Road District will use tax revenue to:

- Update and maintain roads, signs, and streetlights
- Provide right of way clearance
- Fund general operations.

It is estimated the new Local Option Tax will provide additional revenue to Lake Point Special Road District of approximately \$40,000 in 2023-2024, \$41,200 in 2024-2025, \$42,436 in 2025-2026, \$43,709 in 2026-2027, \$45,020 in 2027-2028.

The estimated tax costs for this measure are ESTIMATES ONLY based on the best information available from the County Assessor at the time of estimation.

**MEASURE 21-212 – CENTRAL OREGON COAST FIRE & RESCUE (CCF&R) –Local Option Tax For
Central Coast Fire & Rescue**

QUESTION

Shall CCF&R establish a tax for operations of \$0.35 per \$1000 assessed value for five years beginning 2023-2024?

This measure may cause property taxes to increase more than three percent.

SUMMARY

Approval of this measure would establish a local option tax to replace the current ten-year serial levy tax of \$0.25 per \$1000 assessed value, set to expire in the tax year 2023, with a five-year local option tax for \$0.35 per \$1000 of assessed value.

It is estimated that this measure would raise approximately \$158,608.85 in tax revenues for 2023-2024; \$163,366.65 in tax revenues for 2024-2025; \$168,267.65 in tax revenues for 2025-2026; \$173,315.68 in tax revenues for 2026-2027 and \$178,515.15 for 2027-2028.

Revenues would be used by the Central Oregon Coast Fire & Rescue District to continue to support the staffing of Fire, EMS, and Rescue personnel, maintain volunteer programs, update and replace equipment, and purchase personal protective equipment, hose, and other tools.

MEASURE 21-213 – DEVILS LAKE WATER IMPROVEMENT DISTRICT – 5-year local option tax for operations

QUESTION

Shall district levy \$0.2499 (In-Watershed) and \$0.128 (Outside-Watershed) per \$1,000 assessed value for Operations for five years beginning 2023-2024?

This measure may cause property taxes to increase more than three percent.

SUMMARY

The tax revenue from this measure would allow the District to continue its vegetation management program. Programs to be funded annually by the revenue include approximately \$200,000 for targeted herbicide treatments, \$50,000 for mechanical harvesting and disposal, and \$67,000 for re-stocking and managing grass carp in Devils Lake. DLWID has in their operating budget money's for vegetation management, this levy is above what the district needs to control the vegetation currently in the lake.

It is estimated the new Local Option Tax will provide the following revenue: \$317,166 in 2023- 2024, \$326,680 in 2024-2025, \$336,480 in 2025-2026, \$346,574 in 2026-2027, and \$356,971 in 2027-2028. "The estimated tax cost for this measure is an ESTIMATE ONLY based on the best information available from the county assessor at the time of the estimate and may reflect the impact of early payment discounts, compression and the collection rate."

MEASURE 21-214 – YACHATS RURAL FIRE PROTECTION DISTRICT– Fire, Rescue and EMS Services Local Option Tax (LOT)

QUESTION

Shall YRFPD establish a five-year LOT of \$1.59 per \$1,000 assessed value for fire, rescue, emergency medical services beginning 2023-2024?

This measure may cause property taxes to increase more than three percent.

SUMMARY

The LOT revenue will:

- Fund emergency service operations to meet continued community growth needs.
- Continue funding six full-time career firefighters.
- Test, maintain and repair fire and rescue vehicles and personal protective equipment.
- Maintain and repair YRFPD facilities.
- Expand volunteer recruitment programs.

An existing LOT of \$0.59 will expire in June of 2023.

The total cost of emergency services is greater than the revenue stream that pays for those services. The last voter-approved new LOT was 15 years ago. Since then basic costs to provide and support emergency

services increased at least 30-35%, and during the same time, emergency service calls volumes have doubled. The current tax revenue will not fund emergency services at the level being demanded by both an aging population base and increased growth within YRFPD.

Failure to pass this LOT will necessitate cutting back services, reducing the number of Firefighter/Paramedics. This would result in an inability to respond timely to some emergency calls. Reduced YRFPD service capability could cause home insurance rates to increase.

It is estimated the new Local Option Tax will increase revenue to YRFPD by \$1,020,488 in 2023-2024, \$1,056,205 in 2024-2025, \$1,093,172 in 2025-2026, \$1,131,433 in 2026-2027, and \$1,171,034 in 2027-2028.

MEASURE 21-215 – CITY OF LINCOLN CITY –Amends Charter to increase lodging tax from 9.5% to 12%.

QUESTION

Should the City of Lincoln City transient room tax be increased from 9.5 percent to 12 percent?

SUMMARY

This Charter amendment will increase the lodging tax paid by visitors to Lincoln City by 2.5 percentage points from nine and one-half percent (9.5%) to twelve percent (12%). The City last increased the transient room tax in May of 2008. This Charter amendment will not change how revenues for the existing 9.5 percent transient room tax are currently allocated in the Charter. The revenues from the additional two and one-half percent (2.5%) tax will be allocated as provided in the state law in effect at the time the increase is effective in July 2023; Currently state law provides that seventy percent (70%) goes to tourism promotion or to tourism-related facilities and no more than thirty percent (30%) goes to the general fund/public safety purposes. The City generally intends to fund police services (narcotics detective) and city park improvements from the general fund portion and tourism promotion and tourism-related facilities (like a new D River visitor information center/ restroom) from the tourism portion.
