This Voters' Pamphlet is provided to give you, the voter, additional information on candidates and measures. You will not vote on every office in this pamphlet. Your ballot will contain only those issues for which you are eligible to vote—based on where you live and your party affiliation. Each candidate had the opportunity to submit a picture and statement regarding his/her candidacy.

This Primary Election will be held completely by mail. Your ballot will arrive in the mail on or near May 2nd. After voting your ballot, you may drop it in the mail or deposit it at one of our drop sites listed on page 21-2 in this pamphlet. And, for your convenience,

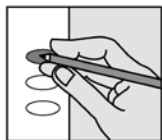

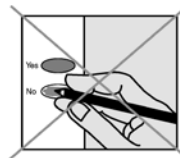
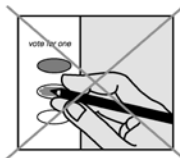

Drive-Up Ballot Drop Boxes Now Available in Newport, Lincoln City, Toledo and Waldport



Drive-up ballot drop boxes are now available at the Lincoln County Courthouse in Newport, the Lincoln City City Hall in Lincoln City, the Toledo Police Station in Toledo, and the Waldport City Hall in Waldport. These drive-up ballot boxes will be available 24 hours a day, 7 days a week from April 2nd through 8:00pm on May 19th.

Newport:

Lincoln County Courthouse – located in rear parking lot at the east end of the second row of parking. Go west on West Olive Street to 4-way stop by the jail.

Turn left onto SW Nye Street.

Turn left into second entrance to courthouse rear parking lot.

Go all the way to the end of the row and you will see the ballot box on the left side. (It is marked “Official Ballot Drop Site.”)

Put your ballot in the box without having to get out of your car!

Lincoln City:

Lincoln City City Hall – located in the lower parking lot under the City Hall.

Turn west at the stop light by the City Hall. (across from Burger King).

Enter the one-way entrance to the parking lot under the building.

The ballot box is near the elevators next to the water payment box and the book and video drops. (It is marked “Official Ballot Drop Site.”)

Put your ballot in the box without having to get out of your car!

Toledo (NEW Drive-Up Ballot Box):

Toledo Police Station - located in the Police Station parking lot at the A Street exit.

Turn north at the stop light onto A Street.

Turn left onto NW 6th Street and enter the Police Station parking lot.

Stay to the left and go to the one-way exit that exits back onto A Street.

You will see the ballot box on the left by the exit. (It is marked, “Official Ballot Drop Site.”)

Put your ballot in the box without having to get out of your car!

Waldport:

Waldport City Hall – located in the City Hall parking lot at the east exit.

Go to City Hall on Highway 34.

Turn south between the City Hall and the school.

Take an immediate right into the City Hall parking lot.

Continue around the island and you will see the ballot box on the left by the exit. (It is marked “Official Ballot Drop Site.”)

Put your ballot in the box without having to get out of your car!

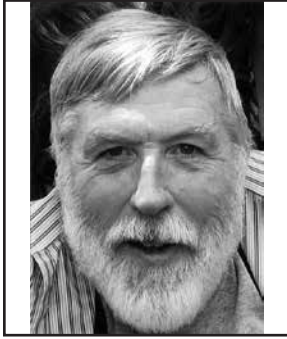
New Drive-Up Drop Box at Toledo Police Station

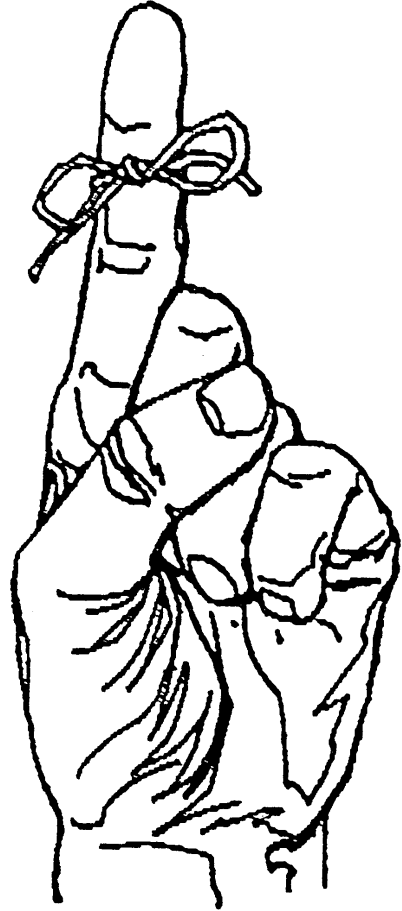

Important Notice Regarding Drop Sites for May 19 Primary Election

Please vote early and place your ballot in the mail by May 12. No postage is required to mail your ballot! But please mail by May 12 so that your ballot will be sure to get to us by election day. (Postmarks do not count.)

Drop sites are also available until 8:00pm on May 19.

Due to the COVID-19 Virus, some City Halls with inside Ballot Drop Boxes may be closed to walk-in traffic during the election period.

If this happens, the following alternative drop boxes are available:

Lincoln City: Outside Drive-up Drop Box in lower City Hall parking lot

Newport: Outside Drive-up Drop Box in Courthouse parking lot

Toledo: Outside Drive-up Drop Box in Toledo Police Station parking lot

Waldport: Outside Drive-up Drop Box in City Hall parking lot

Depoe Bay: Locked Drop Box located outside main City Hall door

Siletz: Locked Drop Box located at City Hall

Yachats: Locked Drop Box located in City Hall outside the double doors

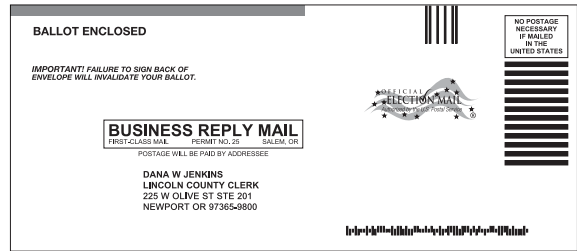
The County Clerk's Office and the County Courthouse may possibly be closed to walk-in traffic during COVID-19 Virus restrictions. If this happens and you need assistance regarding your ballot and the voting process, please call us at 541.265.4131, and we will make sure you get the help you need. There is a Drive-up Ballot Drop Box in the Courthouse rear parking lot for your convenience.

What is a prepaid postage envelope?

You don't have to find a stamp

With prepaid postage, you no longer have to search for a stamp to mail back your voted ballot.

Beginning this year, all ballots in Oregon will be sent to voters with a prepaid postage return envelope.



How does it work?

If you mail back your voted ballot, the Post Office will charge the State of Oregon for each ballot sent back to an Elections Official.

Only those ballots sent back through the mail will be charged to the State.

What about Drop sites?



Using one of Lincoln County's drop sites is faster and will reach us before the deadline as long as you drop your ballot in the dropbox before 8:00pm on May 19.

Postmarks DO NOT count

In Oregon, an Elections Official must have your ballot by 8:00pm on Election Night. If your ballot is still with the Post Office after 8:00pm on Election night **your vote will not count.**

Postmarks **DO NOT** count for ballots in Oregon!!

*If we have not received your ballot by 8:00pm on Election Night, **your vote will not count.***

Precinct Committeepersons

What is a Precinct Committeeperson?

If you are a member of the Democratic or Republican party, you will receive a ballot with “Precinct Committeepersons” on it.

- These are people who represent their political party in each precinct on a countywide “Central Committee”.
- Precinct Committeepersons help set the party agenda and party platform.
- They act as directors of the local party Central Committee, attend meetings of the committee, help candidates run for office, and conduct the business of the party.
- Central Committees elect people to represent the county at the state level, and those members select the representatives to the national committees.
- They also help select replacements for vacated state offices (Oregon House or Senate offices).

Voting for Precinct Committeepersons (PCPs):

To qualify as a Precinct Committeeperson (PCP), one must have lived in the county and have been registered in their political party for at least 180 days prior to the Primary Election. A person can represent the precinct in which they live, an adjacent precinct (within the same county) or another precinct within the same House District (within the same county). They serve a two-year term.

A Committeeperson is elected in each precinct for every 250 voters (or major part thereof) that are registered in the precinct as of September 11th (251 days prior to the Primary Election).

Your ballot will indicate how many offices are available in your precinct. For instance, it would say “Vote For Six” if there are six offices available for your precinct. If you are not registered as a Democrat or Republican, Precinct Committeepersons will not appear on your ballot.

- You **do not have to vote** for any PCPs (yes, the rest of your votes will still count).
- You do not have to complete each available position if you do not want to.
- Where a candidate has filed, mark your selection like any other race.
- If you want to write in a name that is not on the ballot, fill the box next to “Write-in”, then neatly write the person’s name of your choice on the line provided.



- **To be elected, a “write-in” candidate must:**
 - A. receive at least 3 (three) votes from members of their party in that precinct**
 - B. and have filed an SEL 105D before election night**
 - C. or someone else needs to have filed an SEL 105N before election night**
- **Only write-in candidates who have their name filed with the elections office by 8:00pm on Election Night will have their write-in votes tallied.**

Registration and Voting Information

Registering to Vote

To be eligible to vote in the May 19, 2020 Primary Election, a completed voter registration card must be postmarked by April 28, 2020.

To Register To Vote In Oregon, You Must Be:

1. A resident of Oregon.
2. A United States citizen.
3. At least 18 years old by election day.

You Must Update Your Registration If:

1. Your residence or mailing address changes.
2. Your name changes.
3. You wish to change your party affiliation.

Important Note: If you have moved or your name has changed and you have not yet updated your registration, you may still be eligible to vote. Contact the Lincoln County Elections office, 541-265-4131 for further information.

Voters With Disabilities:

If you are unable to vote your ballot without assistance, contact the Lincoln County Elections office at 541-265-4131. We will provide two persons to assist you in voting. To assure your voted ballot is received by election day, contact the elections office early to arrange for assistance. You may also select someone else of your own choice to assist you.

Check Your Ballot!

To vote you must fill in the oval (●) completely with a pencil or pen.

To write-in a name — Fill in the oval (●) to the left of the dotted line and write-in the name on the dotted line.

Your vote **will not count** for that candidate or measure.

You do not have to vote on all contests. Those you do vote on will still be counted.

Remember, if stated on your ballot, vote both sides of your ballot.

After voting—SEAL the ballot in the ballot secrecy envelope. **The secrecy envelope is optional – it is not required.**

SEAL your BALLOT (enclosed in the secrecy envelope), inside the return envelope, **SIGN THE RETURN ENVELOPE** in the space provided, and mail it in time to be received in the office of the County Clerk by May 19th, or drop it off at a designated drop site (see drop sites on page 21-2 of this county voters' pamphlet).

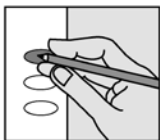

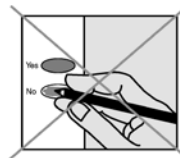
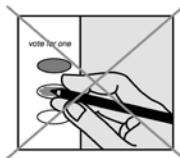

Directions:

- Turn north at the stop light onto A Street.
- Turn left onto NW 6th Street and enter the Police Station parking lot.
- Stay to the left and go to the one-way exit that exits back onto A Street.
- You will see the ballot box on the left by the exit. (It is marked, “Official Ballot Drop Site.”)
- Put your ballot in the box without having to get out of your car!
